Ensuring Wyoming's Voice is Heard


I am pleased to announce that I have landed coveted seats on key Senate Committees that have a direct impact on the economy, safety, and lives of Wyoming people.

As part of the Indian Affairs Committee, I will address health care needs, improve economic development interests, and make necessary improvements to Indian education.



On June 25, 2007, Wyoming physician and community leader John Barrasso was sworn in to the United States Senate.

John served Natrona County in the Wyoming State Senate. In the Legislature, he was known for getting the job done. He was one of the original sponsors of the Hathaway Scholarship which allows Wyoming high school students to further their education. He was a strong advocate for veterans and the National Guard and worked to make Wyoming's roads safer for young drivers.

Known as "Wyoming's Doctor," he worked to bring low-cost health screening exams to people all around the Cowboy State. He has additionally done television and radio reports giving people health information they can use to stay healthy and keep down the cost of their medical care.
